VACAVILLE — The warm, inviting foyer of LuAnn and Mark Chambers' refurbished 1922 home on Buck Avenue beckoned as soon as the door opened.

Right off the foyer, in the parlor, a fire glowed in the wood-burning fireplace, holiday-scented candles warmed the room and the beautifully-lit Christmas tree stood elegantly in the hexagonal music alcove fronted by a bay window.

The Chambers were just one of seven Vacaville families who opened up their homes Saturday to celebrate

the holidays with the Vacaville Museum Guild's 2009 Holiday Home Tour.

The homes, scattered throughout Vacaville, rang in the holiday season in numerous ways. Some opted for elegant, some a combination of elegance and playful, while others displayed vast holiday collections. But all gave off the vibrant cheer of the impending holiday.

Vaca facilities for needy to expand

VACAVILLE — The Opportunity House Thrift Center and the Vacaville Storehouse will soon move to new, larger locations that will allow them to serve more of Vacaville's needy.

The Thrift Center, which supports the Opportunity House homeless shelter, is moving to what was once the Stupid Prices store near the north end of Peabody Road.

The Vacaville Storehouse, which distributes food and clothing to the needy, is moving a couple of doors down from its present location to 1146 E. Monte Vista Ave.

Both programs' directors are excited about the moves.

"We will be going from 3,000 square feet to about 10,000 square feet. This will allow us to also have additional storage and some classroom space for our clients. It lets us do so much more for our clients and the community," Opportunity House Executive Director Colleen Erdes said.

"We are very excited about our new home," Vacaville Storehouse Director Bob Johnson said. "Not only because it's a larger facility, but we will be able to stay more organized."

The Opportunity House governing board recently approved the Thrift Store's move. Erdes said she hopes to open up the new location in early January.

The Peabody Road site gives the store much more

visibility than its present home at 640 E. Main St.

"We are hoping this will result in a 25 percent increase in business for us," Erdes said. "It's a lofty goal, but it is better location."

More space means the store can display furniture and offer a larger selection of clothing and other items.

"We are also planning to expand our hours a bit to seven days a week and staying open on Tuesday nights," Erdes said.

This comes at a time when the Opportunity House is making plans with the help from the Vacaville Redevelopment Agency to move the shelter to larger accommodations on Bennett

Hill Court.

The agency wants to move the shelter so it can advance plans to redevelop the area around the shelter's Catherine Street site to a mixed-use development.

The Vacaville Storehouse is within a week of opening in the former Goodyear Tire Center, which is 1,200 square feet larger than its present location.

Johnson hopes to have a soft opening sometime between Thursday and Saturday.

"Because of an increase in our clients as a direct result of our economy, it is needed," Johnson said.

The larger building will also allow the town's home-

less to get afternoon meals at the Storehouse instead of in Andrews Park where they are being fed now.

Initially, the Storehouse's hours of operation will stay the same, "but in January, we are hoping to be open an additional evening," Johnson said.

The present hours are from 9 a.m. to noon Monday, Wednesday and Saturday, and from 4:30 to 6:30 p.m. Thursday.

"We hope to have a grand opening soon to allow the city to get better acquainted with us," Johnson said.

Suisun City eyes signs to drive more motorists into town

SUISUN CITY — An electronic reader board and murals on buildings facing Highway 12 are among the ideas the Suisun City Council will mull over Tuesday when it looks at ways to get more motorists to stop in town.

A council ad hoc committee has come forward with a half dozen ideas to improve public signs in and around the city's downtown.

Council members are expected to discuss the ideas and tell city staff which ones they should pursue.

The top proposal is to replace the event sign at Pennsylvania Avenue and Highway 12 with an electronic reader board that allows City Hall to update event information more often.

A sign specifically announcing the waterfront would also be put by the Suisun train station.

The committee also proposes to put a large waterfront district logo on the north side of the city water tank facing the railroad near Highway 12 and Marina Boulevard.

Murals promoting the downtown for the Family Cookie Company building and retaining walls on the Highway 12 flyway also

made the list.

Funding will come from \$265,000 that was already budgeted this year to improve gateway and way-finding signs.

Suisun City has been looking for ways to increase its visibility and get people to dine and shop on the city's waterfront businesses as well as attend events.

Earlier this year, the council finally got Caltrans to put up more descriptive freeway exit signs.

The Suisun City Historic Waterfront Business Improvement District got into the act in October 2008 when it painted a 65-foot-high blue sign on the water tank facing Highway 12.

State crews plan work in I-80 in Vacaville

VACAVILLE — Interstate 80 nighttime lane closures for Mason Street bridge repairs have been
